## **ORCHESTRATING CHANGE:**

## AN AWARD-WINNING DOCUMENTARY ABOUT AN ORCHESTRA ERASING MENTAL HEALTH STIGMA

Two psychiatrists, two physicians, a medical student, a laboratory worker, and a nursing assistant are tuning-up their instruments—but this is not a medical orchestra. They are members of the only orchestra in the world created by and for people living with mental illness and their supporters. About half of the musicians in Me2/Orchestra have been diagnosed with mental illnesses including bipolar disorder, schizophrenia, borderline personality disorder, anxiety, depression, and addiction. The mission of Me2/Orchestra is to erase mental health stigma one concert at a time. Its transformative model is truly changing the lives of the musicians and challenging audiences to reconsider their misconceptions about mental illness.

Orchestrating Change is an award-winning documentary that tells the inspiring story of this groundbreaking orchestra. Seen across the country on public television stations, the film was the 2021 winner of the Austen Riggs Erikson Prize for Excellence in Mental Health Media. Video Librarian named it one of the best documentaries of 2021.

Me2/Orchestra is the realization of Music Director and conductor Ronald Braunstein's ambition to create an orchestra for "people like me." A graduate of Juilliard, Braunstein was first American to win the prestigious Herbert Karaian von International Conducting Competition. Soon after he was conducting the Berlin Philharmonic, the San Francisco Symphony, among many others. Shunned by the classical music he community after made diagnosis of bipolar disorder public, his once meteoric career plummeted. Nearly destitute and fearing he would never conduct professionally again, Braunstein, along with his new wife, Caroline Whiddon, an orchestra administrator, founded Me2/Orchestra



in 2011 in Burlington, Vermont. They soon started a second orchestra in Boston. Me2/Orchestra has no auditions, anyone can join. Their seriously



enforced "No Stigma Zone" starts with a sign stating just that on the rehearsal room door. People with and without diagnoses are breaking down barriers by creating music together in an environment where acceptance is the norm. It's a transformative model for any community orchestra or group.

With compelling characters, striking animation, beautiful music, even humor, Orchestrating Change addresses many of the myths, perpetuated by the media, about mental illness by showing what living with a mental illness is really like. The film, too, challenges audiences to reconsider their preconceived notions. For those living with a diagnosis, it is empowering.

# MUSICALLY TALENTED HEALTH CARE WORKERS FORM ADVENTHEALTH'S FIRST-EVER ORCHESTRA

Health care workers are accustomed to hearing a lot of sounds: beeping monitors, humming machines, overhead pages, rolling patient beds. Now there's a new project offering AdventHealth health care workers the opportunity to make their own sounds: the sounds of music.

The project is the AdventHealth Orchestra and it's bringing together the best of AdventHealth's musically talented team members and physicians, beginning with those who are located in the Greater Orlando area.

The first iteration of the orchestra has been the string section, which includes the violin, viola, cello and double bass. The plan is to expand soon to percussion, brass and woodwind instruments.

The first of its kind at AdventHealth, the musical group is being directed by Richard Hickam, director of music and the arts for AdventHealth.

For their first performance, the AdventHealth Orchestra played Samuel Barber's "The Adagio" honor members to team who've served on the front of lines the COVID-19 pandemic, as well as those who've lost their lives to the virus. Some of the orchestra members themselves have felt the pressure of the front lines.

"This particular piece was chosen because it has become a piece that has been recognized during times of national mourning," Hickam said. "It's that dark minor [key] that gives this piece this really rich, heavy feeling, but it's worth it for the story that we're telling."

"This is a great opportunity. I really can't describe this feeling – to be together with colleagues that worked alongside you during this pandemic," said Vincent Hsu, MD, executive director of infection prevention and violinist in the orchestra. "It just goes beyond words."

Members of the AdventHealth Orchestra will dedicate free time to about two concerts a

year at AdventHealth or community events with the ultimate goal of helping people feel whole through music. Oftentimes, the people feeling whole will include the musicians themselves.

"Being able to play in the orchestra is a good opportunity for us to pause from our daily duties and responsibilities to reflect and take care of ourselves," said Grace Lai, director of safety and high reliability at AdventHealth Orlando, also a violinist. "This is a good exercise to rebuild our own resilience."

## **UTAH MEDICAL ORCHESTRA**

The Utah Medical Orchestra (UMO) was founded in 2021 by a small group of medical students at the University of Utah School of Medicine. Composed of members of the Salt Lake City healthcare community, including doctors, nurses, students, research scientists, and hospital staff, the UMO has caught the attention of the U of U School of Medicine Alumni Association, the Utah Symphony, and the CEO of U of U Health, who featured the orchestra's efforts in an email to the healthcare community, praising the orchestra for "a beautiful performance" which served as "a reminder of how great it is to be part of this incredible organization."

Under the baton of music director Dr. Matthew Mainella, DMA, the UMO held its inaugural concert in November 2021 at the U of U's Libby Gardner Hall. The concert was free and open to the public, with a live audience of nearly 300, as well as a virtual audience. The concert featured Grieg's Holberg Suite, Barber's Adagio for Strings, Bartok's Romanian Folk Dances, and performances from several small wind and string chamber ensembles. There have been several unique challenges to starting an orchestra in the midst of a global pandemic. The UMO has been fortunate to be able to rehearse in person in the Eccles Health Sciences Education Building on campus. Due to COVID masking requirements, we decided to limit involvement in the orchestra to strings only at this time. Winds and brass have been able to participate in smaller chamber ensembles, where they are permitted to rehearse socially-distanced without masks. The UMO receives financial support from the Associated Students of the University of Utah due to its status as a student interest group.

One of our aims in founding the Utah Medical Orchestra was to provide a flexible creative outlet for healthcare professionals, and to break down barriers of hierarchy within the hospital. We look forward to a bright future of continuing these goals while bringing music to the community. We plan to incorporate winds, brass, and percussion into the orchestra as soon as the COVID situation allows. Other future initiatives include volunteer performances at the University of Utah Hospital, bringing interactive music sessions to Primary Children's Hospital, and collaborations with the Utah Symphony.

The World Doctors Orchestra (WDO) is a group of approximately 700 medical musicians from around the world. The WDO gathers 3 or 4 times a year for a week at a time in various locations around the world, with recent performances in Amsterdam, Anguilla, and Frankfurt. Concert weeks typically involve rehearsals for 3-4 days followed by 2 performances before group members head back to their respective countries. The WDO is led by Dr. Stephan Willich, an accomplished cardiologist, epidemiologist, and conductor as well as the former director of the Academy of Music Hanns Eisler Berlin. The World Doctors USA helps to facilitate one or two WDO concerts per year in the USA. We have performed in Washington DC, San Francisco, Seattle, Houston and Cleveland. Later this year we will perform in Boston alongside the Longwood Symphony Orchestra, performing Mahler 10 and Firebird. The concert is scheduled for September 18, 2022 in Boston Symphony Hall. For any of you in the northeast, please come and hear us perform!

We are planning future USA concerts in Dallas in 2023, Phoenix and New York in 2024 and Chicago in 2025. All of our proceeds from each concert are donated to local medical charities.
